



### **SPONSORS & SUPPORTERS**



















Randwick Art Society members were treated to a fascinating presentation by accredited artist **Marie McMahon** April 29 at the Randwick Literary Institute. Marie showed botanical artworks, and told how she was always interested on observing natural forms. She painted bush foods, fruits and flower compositions, often choosing oval or round canvases, and showed a painted a series of studies of the iconic Australian Gymea Lily; found typically in the coastal areas of Sydney. With no scientific background, she developed an interest in conservation.

During the pandemic lockdown, she created beautiful collages from images of bacteria and viruses on the size of round Petrie dishes. They looked like flowers and she described them as *Toxic Blooms*. They were exhibited at the Nurses Walk at Rocks in 2023.

**Simon Kapodistrias** gave an informative video presentation o the eccentric Spanish Surrealist painter, Salvador Dali.

In his youth, Dali was enrolled in the San Fernando Academy, where he mastered the great technical skill characteristic of his style. Dali and the Surrealist painters were inspired by Sigmund Freud's belief that dreams could reveal the unconscious mind, and explored how to bring dreams to the canvas, sculptures, film, poetry and more. The Surrealists' imagery became characteristic of depicting shock associations, eg giraffes appearing on fire, the placing of a donkey on a piano, the turning of a gallery into a bedroom and a jungle, plus the famous Lobster Telephone.

Simon's video compilation of many of Dali's famous paintings revealed the extraordinary talent of one of the most celebrated and influential artists of all time. Included in Simon's presentation was also film footage of Dali's special appearance on the Dick Cavett Show in 1971, when he brought his pet Ant Eater with him on to the set for his interview.



RAS members were treated to an artist's talk and two demonstrations on Monday 24th June by watercolour artist, Robyn Langford-Brown. Robyn told how she had taken up watercolour painting after she retired, and how she had painted a variety of subjects, but had mostly painted botanical art and preferred to paint flowers. She stressed the importance of using top quality materials for the best result, and to have great patience in drying coats of washes before re-applying. Members learned the difference between hot-pressed watercolour paper being a smoother and less absorbent surface to paint on than the more textured cold-pressed paper. Robyn showed a large body of colourful botanical studies, and how she made her own colour charts to refer to.

Thank you Robyn for a very informative talk, and for sharing tips about colourmixing and brushes and techniques she used to achieve such beautiful effects in her compositions.

Hannah Sunito exhibited with her mentors, Niki, Lynn and Kurt Koeppl on a VERY rainy Saturday, June 1. The venue is excellent and there are plans to have more one day exhibitions, FREE to RAS members (think in terms of a market stall with paintings on easels) We will keep you posted via email.
